Superlative Adjectives

Superlative adjectives are used to compare **three or more** other nouns. They show a noun as having the highest or lowest degree of a quality.

Rules	Examples	What NOT to do
#1: For short adjectives, <u>add ~est</u>	Ex) small ----> smallest	
#2: For longer adjectives (2 or more syllables), <u>use "most/least" before the adjective</u>	Ex) beautiful -----> most/least beautiful	beautifulest
#3: Don't use <u>~est</u> and <u>most/least</u> together.	Ex) funny -----> funniest, or most/least funny	most funniest
